### **Saving the Trees**

Local businesswoman Kathleen Panek is intent on preserving Downers Grove's natural heritage, even if it means saving one tree at a time.

Panek, who owns the computer consulting firm ConnecTech Solutions, learned in May that the Village was planning to cut down 15 honey locust and flowering crab apple trees located behind her office at 5121 Main Street. The removal of the 15-year-old trees was part of a project that demolished two buildings to make way for temporary parking.

After hiring an arborist, Panek intended to try to save all of the trees, even lining up private citizens, including members of the Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance, to pay for the cost of transplanting them. In the end, however, she was able to save just one crab apple tree, which now stands in her mother's front yard.

"It's doing really, really well," Panek said. "We're really enjoying it. But it's very sad that the others weren't saved. It was so beautiful (behind her office) and now there's nothing."

The other trees were cut down when Village officials determined that transplanting them would not be feasible. The presence of underground electrical equipment prevented the uprooting of several trees, while others did not have enough soil around them to survive the move.

"When the tree spade went in, it kept hitting concrete and gravel," Panek said. "There was only two feet of earth around some of them." Still, Panek was happy that something good came out of an effort that saw her expend \$460 of her own money.

"It was definitely a challenge," she said. "Trees are just so wonderful and they enhance the area. Everybody I talked to loved those trees and nobody did anything about it."

Panek hopes to change that. Noting that Glen Ellyn and several other communities in the Chicago area have tree preservation ordinances, she is pushing for similar legislation in Downers Grove.

"I'm interested in getting the Village to transplant any trees before removing them," Panek said. "In the future I want to make it conducive to transplanting a tree if it needs to be moved."

### **Interpretive Center Opens Its Doors**

The Lyman Woods Interpretive Center opened its doors June 21.

The one-story building was funded by a state grant and is run by the Downers Grove Park District, which bills the center as the "Gateway to Lyman Woods." A recent tour of the building showed why that title is accurate.

Set well back from its 24-space parking lot on 31st Street, the Interpretive Center is painted in muted green and brown colors. The structure blends well into its background, combining muted colors with a "green" roof, which is adorned with various native plantings.

Inside, Park District staff and volunteers and an interactive display showing short videos on the geologic history of the area, along with the habitats of the flora and fauna native to the 135-acre preserve, welcome visitors.

Behind that room is an area where children can make nature-themed crafts and see examples of some of the plants located in the woods. With its floor-to-ceiling windows, the visitor gets an up-close view into the preserve.

The Interpretive Center is open from 1 to 4 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. A grand opening is planned for August 23.

Various nature programs are offered for children, adults and youth groups. A visit to the Interpretive Center is recommended. It is an excellent way to learn more about Lyman Woods, a unique and valuable example of our natural heritage.

### **PDHA Supports the Interpretive Center**

Members of Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance have followed with great interest the design and construction of an Interpretive Center at the Lyman Woods Preserve. At our recent quarterly board meeting, Directors of the Heritage Alliance voted to work with the Grove Foundation and staff of the Park District on projects in support of the Lyman Woods Interpretive Center. Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance approved spending \$750 toward educational materials in cooperation with the Grove Foundation.

Details about the specific items to be purchased are to be worked out by the leadership of the Heritage Alliance in discussions with the leadership of the Grove Foundation and Park District staff. Heritage Alliance Directors expressed particular interest in supporting the proposed interpretive trail backpacks and in supporting a resident library at the Interpretive Center to increase understanding of natural resources and conservation activities.

Directors of Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance also approved spending an additional \$750 toward restoration work associated with the Lyman Woods Interpretive Center. Details about the specific items to be purchased are to be worked out by the leadership of the Heritage Alliance in discussions with the Park District staff and may be finalized at the September Board Meeting (Sept. 10 at 7:00pm at Lincoln Center, 935 Maple Ave). All members of the Alliance are welcome to attend and participate in the discussion at the quarterly meetings of the board of directors.

#### **Short Takes**

The bicycle rack donated by PDHA in 2001 and originally located at the 33rd Street entrance to Lyman Woods, just east of Highland Avenue, has now been relocated to the main entrance of the Preserve near the Interpretive Center on 31st Street. The 33rd Street temporary parking lot is now normally closed to the public.

A new trail installation along the east side of Lyman Woods is nearing completion. The restrictive covenant granted last year to the Forest Preserve District by Midwestern University makes this new, permanent trail alignment possible.

PDHA directors have been closely monitoring Park District Commissioner's discussions about possible sites for a new swimming pool. We are working to ensure that our community's outstanding natural heritage sites are adequately protected.
